# **The Gathering**

As a community we gather on this Remembrance Sunday, in marking the time, when on the IIth day of the IIth month, at the IIth hour, 105 years ago, the guns fell silent on the Western Front, bringing to an end the First World War. We come to remember all those who have given their lives for the peace and freedom that we enjoy and join with people across the nation to pause to reflect on the sacrifices made by our brave service men and women. As such, we will observe the collective act of two minutes silence as we stand together and reflect on the price of freedom. The price that is still being paid, with more than 12,000 British servicemen and women who have been killed or injured on active duty since 1945.
